



# The Good Shepherd

## Fourth Sunday of Easter

Dear Brothers in the Lord, Life, Love and Easter Joy.

Greetings and many blessings in this new Easter season that is already on its way, and that the Lord has given us with his immense goodness and mercy to rejoice with the Church and all our brothers and sisters.

We are coming to the end of this month of April and in the middle of the joy of Easter time we will start a new month in this year that continues to give us new challenges and joys to live.

Let us remember, brothers and sisters, that Easter is synonymous with joy, life, and a newness with the Lord. So let's continue to live this beautiful time with all the life that the Lord gives us, with all the novelties that come into our lives, with all the opportunities that life gives and offers us.

On this Fourth Sunday of Easter we have two central realities or themes: We celebrate the World Day for Vocations in the Church and we connect with an emblematic and proper figure of the Lord Jesus: The Good Shepherd. Two themes that go hand in hand and invite us to approach, pray and ask that Good Shepherd for our Church. It is the Lord Jesus himself who recognizes himself when he says "I am the Good Shepherd" (Jn 10:11); a "Good Shepherd" who knows, loves, calls by name, carries and gives his life for his sheep.



On this particular theme, Father Octavio Ortiz tells us in a beautiful reflection: "The theme of the Good Shepherd appears in a relevant way on this Fourth Sunday of Easter. The image of the Good Shepherd, which was easily understood in Jesus' time and which was frequently used in the Bible, appears here as a concrete translation of what happened in the paschal mystery: Christ gathered us from the pastures of death where we had wandered. He reconquered us for the love of God, and brought us to the fullness of communion with the Father. "That Good Shepherd who gave his life for the sheep, went out to look for the lost sheep in the mountains and hills where man offered sacrifices to idols. And when he found the lost sheep, he carried it on his shoulders on which he had also carried the wood of the cross, and thus led it back to eternal life" (St. Gregory of Nazianzus, *Dissertations*, Diss. 45, 26.28: PG 36, 658-659.662). Two images help us in our reflection. The first is the third-century painting of the Good Shepherd in the catacombs of Sts. Peter and Marcellin. The Good Shepherd presents himself as a young man who, in the middle of the pastures, has picked up the lost sheep and carries it on his shoulders while being surrounded by two other sheep. In the simplicity of this early Christian painting, the interest of that Shepherd who does not let a single one of his sheep be lost is evident; who goes looking for the stray and rejoices when, having found it, carries it on his shoulders and returns it to the fold."

Let us therefore approach our Good Shepherd, brothers and sisters on this Fourth Sunday, and accompanied by his immense love during this Easter season, and commit to put forth our best attitude to gladden our heart, and fill our being with a beautiful, positive and joyful, "new" attitude; and with the best of wishes for each of us and our entire parish community.

From the hand of Mary, our Mother and Mother of God, who also accompanied her son Jesus and his disciples in the joyful proclamation of the Gospel; we put each of our requests, desires and wishes, so that our Blessed Mother – and especially in this month of May that is almost here – intercedes for us and covers us with her mantle.

## RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

### Cut to the Heart

Everyone who has been married knows this feeling: you're in the midst of a disagreement with your spouse. You've really dug in your heels. You're ready to die on this hill. And you have the awful, heartbreaking realization that you are wrong. Whatever it is you're arguing about, you're wrong. You.

So where do you go from here? The only way forward is to own it. Fess up. Grab a fork and dig into that humble pie. It makes me cringe just to write about it, because it's the worst feeling.

I use the example of marriage because it's the one I'm most familiar with — my closest relationship, the one that teaches me the most about who I am and who God asks me to be. But this is a universal experience, and everyone — single or married, child or adult, lay or ordained — knows how badly it feels to realize that you're wrong. You're human. You messed up.

It is hard to recognize that the Christian life is one of ongoing repentance. It is painful to acknowledge the ways in which we are falling short, even as we strive to follow in Christ's example.

It can, in the words of today's reading, "cut to the heart."

But that feeling of despair is what propels forward motion. We have to allow ourselves to feel bad, that's the fertile ground of penitence. We are meant to have not just life, but life "more abundantly." Stasis isn't the goal. Baptism isn't the finish line.

Examining our conscience is hard. It cuts to the heart. It cuts to the truth.

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# WHY DO WE DO THAT?

## CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED



### Genuflecting & Kneeling

#### Question:

Does it matter what leg you kneel on when genuflecting?

#### Answer:

Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.


The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting, becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist. In our tradition, although many have been taught or prefer to genuflect by placing their right knee on the ground, there is no prescribed way to genuflect. This is especially important to keep in mind if physical limitations or age make certain movements difficult for us.

Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during eucharistic adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward the altar.

## GOSPEL MEDITATION

### 4th Sunday of Easter

I recently rescued a dog. She's a terrier and rather adorable. And she's crazy about me. She could spend all day with me. But I'm a pastor at a parish and sometimes I leave her at the front desk of the church office. She constantly amazes me by her ability to distinguish between my voice and that of everyone else. If I say one word, even if I'm hidden around a corner, she'll sprint toward me and jump up into my arms.

This week the readings focus our attention to the voice of the risen Jesus Christ. Comparing his disciples to sheep and himself to a shepherd, he says, **“They recognize his voice.”** He speaks to us and wants us to respond. When we hear his voice, we follow. Throughout this coming week, we will experience many interior promptings to receive God’s love, and to love Him in return. That’s his voice. Follow it into the safe and tender arms of Christ.

By contrast, some voices we will hear do not convey God’s concern and love for us, but rather produce fear, despair, and other harmful mischief. Jesus calls these voices those of robbers. Does an idea or thought make it harder for you to love God? If so, run away. Let it go. It is most likely not the voice of the Risen Lord. Keep waiting for him to speak. You will recognize his voice. Then run to him as fast as you can. — Father John Muir, ©LPi

# EL BUEN PASTOR

## CUARTO DOMINGO DE PASCUA.

Queridos Hermanos en el Señor la Vida, el Amor y la Alegría Pascual. Un saludo y muchas bendiciones en este nuevo tiempo de Pascua que ya va en camino, y que el Señor nos regala con su inmensa bondad y misericordia para alegrarnos con la Iglesia y todos los hermanos.

Vamos llegando al final de este mes de Abril y en medio del Jolgorio del tiempo Pascual empezaremos un nuevo mes en este año que nos sigue regalando nuevos retos, desafíos y alegrías por vivir.

Recordemos hermanos que Pascua es sinónimo de Alegría, de Vida, de Novedad con el Señor. Así que vamos a continuar viviendo este hermoso tiempo con toda la vida que el Señor nos regala, con todas las novedades que llegan a nuestra vida, con todas las oportunidades que la vida nos brinda y ofrece.

En este cuarto Domingo de Pascua tenemos dos realidades o temas centrales: Celebramos la Jornada Mundial por las Vocaciones en la Iglesia y nos conectamos con una figura emblemática y propia del Señor Jesús: El Buen Pastor. Dos temas que van de la mano y nos invitan a acercarnos, orar y pedir a ese Buen Pastor por nuestra Iglesia. Es el mismo Señor Jesús quien se reconoce así mismo al decir "Yo soy el buen pastor" (Jn 10, 11) un "Buen Pastor" que conoce, ama, llama por su nombre, carga y da la vida por sus ovejas.



Sobre este tema en particular, el Padre Octavio Ortíz nos comenta en una hermosa reflexión: *"El tema del Buen pastor aparece de modo relevante en este cuarto domingo de Pascua. La imagen del Buen Pastor, que se comprendía fácilmente en el tiempo de Jesús y que era frecuentemente usada en la Biblia, aparece aquí como una traducción concreta de cuanto ha sucedido en el misterio pascual: Cristo nos ha recogido de los pastos de muerte por donde nos habíamos dispersado, nos ha reconquistado para el amor de Dios, nos ha llevado a la plenitud de la comunión con el Padre. Aquel buen Pastor que dio su vida por las ovejas salió a buscar la oveja perdida, por las montañas y colinas donde tú (hombre) ofrecías sacrificios a los ídolos. Y cuando encontró la oveja perdida, la cargó sobre sus hombros - sobre los que había cargado también el madero de la cruz- y así la llevó nuevamente a la vida eterna"* (San Gregorio de Nacianzo, *Disertaciones, Dis. 45, 26.28: PG 36, 658-659.662*). Dos imágenes nos ayudan en nuestra reflexión. La primera es la pintura del siglo III del buen Pastor en las catacumbas de san Pedro y Marcelino. El buen Pastor se presenta como un joven que, en medio de los pastos, ha recogido la oveja perdida y la lleva sus hombros, rodeado por otras dos ovejas. En la sencillez de la pintura paleocristiana se pone en evidencia el interés de ese Pastor que no deja que se pierda ni una sola de sus ovejas; que va por la descarrilada y que se alegra cuando, habiéndola encontrado, la carga a los hombros y la devuelve al redil".

Acerquémonos pues hermanos en este Cuarto Domingo a nuestro Buen Pastor y acompañados de su inmenso amor en este tiempo de Pascua comprometamos y vamos a poner nuestra mejor actitud, alegrar nuestro corazón, y toda nuestra persona con actitud hermosa, positiva, alegre, "nueva" en todo sentido; y con los mejores deseos para cada uno de nosotros y toda nuestra comunidad parroquial.

De la mano de María, nuestra Madre y Madre de Dios, que también acompañó a su hijo Jesús y sus discípulos en el Anuncio gozoso del Evangelio; ponemos cada uno de nuestras peticiones, anhelos y deseos, para que nuestra Madre Santísima -y en especial en este mes de mayo que ya viene-, interceda por nosotros y nos cubra con su manto.

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
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
