

Sunday Reflection



This world offers us little by way of good news. Yet there are those in the world who surprise us and restore our faith in the goodness of others. A few days ago, I lost a phone that I had recently finished paying in monthly installments. These days, losing your phone is something like loosing an extension of yourself that carries so many (not always) necessary and personal data, not to mention, above all, our communication with the outside world. Among the thoughts that went through my head was the worry of not being able to cover the cost of a new one, but now with the added expense of some protection plan I should have purchased in the first place. I wasn't too worried about data loss or theft, since everything was recoverable and protected by codes and passwords. Worse case scenario, whoever had my phone might simply wipe it clean and sell it. As these scenarios were passing through my head, I tried once more to call my number and I was answered by a young Guatemalan who just happened to be passing by the entrance of the Church at that moment. He has only been in this country for a month, and was in search of work. He had walked all the way from Hoboken to return my phone after he answered a relative of mine who dialed my number and told him I was a priest and where I lived. With admirable honesty the young man said: "It crossed my mind not to bother looking for the owner and just sell the phone, because I could use the money, but I can't fool God even if I fool you." Such charity left me speechless and grateful. To this good Samaritan apply the words of Jesus: *Whoever gives you a glass of water to drink because you belong to Christ, I assure you that he will not lose his reward* (Mark 9:41). We never know the doors that Providence may open when we think of another's good even when we have every justification to think of our own, and with confidence in that Providence we take the "risky" but better way.

Building on the Cornerstone

Before I married my husband, I assumed there were "ugly houses" and "pretty houses," and that was that. But Matt is an architect, someone who reads books with titles like "A Field Guide to American Houses" for fun and who uses the term *vernacular architecture* like he knows what it means.

Through him, I've come to learn a lot about why certain structures simply don't have a pleasing look. There is a logic to ugliness, as it turns out. One of the main reasons a building or a home might strike some of us as ugly is because it has undergone a careless renovation. Whether out of laziness or an effort to be cost-effective, additions are made that depart from the architectural style of the original structure. The result is slapdash, confusing — ugly, for lack of a better word.

What is added on later must somewhat resemble the original. If you want to depart dramatically from the original style of a building, it's better to build a separate structure altogether.

I think of this principle when I consider Christ as the "cornerstone." We know we are called to model ourselves on Christ, to build on his example. But so often we cherry-pick elements of his message and attempt to build on it with additions that make no sense.

When someone looks at us, at our lives, they should be able to tell after whom that life is patterned. We must resemble the cornerstone, if we do not, it will be apparent, unseemly. You can't see God the Father without embracing God the Son. You can't chart the future of a house without any thought for its past.

If Christ is not our inspiration, he will be our contradiction.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

5th Sunday of Easter

If you had to summarize the essential core of the Christian life, what would it be? Mercy, truth, or love, perhaps? The readings today suggest another word which may surprise you. That word is priesthood.

St. Peter says to us, “**You are a ‘chosen race, a royal priesthood...’**” To be part of a priesthood is to offer a particular sacrifice in order for the community to survive and thrive. Jesus is the great high priest because he offers the one perfect sacrifice which heals and perfects the entire human race. Peter the Apostle wants us to know that all the baptized share in this priestly ministry. The whole of our lives, including every detail, is meant to become our acceptable offering to God.

The baptized exercise this priesthood in many ways, I’ll mention three. At Sunday Mass, in private prayer, and in daily work. At Mass, we offer the sacrifice of our lives with that of the priest, who symbolizes Christ the Priest. In our prayer, a “morning offering” prayer is a great way to offer up all the joys and sufferings of the day to come. In our daily work, we sacrifice our time, comfort, money, and energy to do good for others. All this gives the deepest possible meaning to our lives: we share in the priesthood which saves the world. WHY DO WE DO THAT? -

CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Obligation: Mass or Communion?

Question: Are Catholics obligated to attend Mass each Sunday, or receive Communion each Sunday?

Answer:

The questions about Mass attendance and the reception of Holy Communion are clearly outlined in what are traditionally called the "Precepts" of the Church. These specific teachings are intended to stand alongside the Ten Commandments as fundamental practices for Catholics and are outlined in the Code of Canon Law. The obligations related to Mass attendance and receiving Communion are outlined in the first and third precepts, which we find quoted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (no. 2042):

The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor") requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord as well as the principal liturgical feasts honoring the mysteries of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the saints; in the first place, by participating in the Eucharistic celebration, in which the Christian community is gathered, and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days.

The third precept ("You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season") guarantees as a minimum the reception of the Lord's Body and Blood in connection with the Paschal feasts, the origin and center of the Christian liturgy.

Rather than seeing these as obligations that are simply to be fulfilled out of a sense of duty, Pope Saint John Paul II reminds us of the grace that is made available to us when we gather for Sunday celebrations of the Eucharist: "Sunday is the day which is at the very heart of the Christian life... Time given to Christ is never time lost, but is rather time gained, so that our relationships and indeed our whole life may become more profoundly human" (Dies Domini, no. 7). -©LPI

Reflexión del Domingo



A menudo el mundo nos ofrece pocas buenas noticias. Pero de una manera inesperada, también ofrece experiencias ejemplares de bondad. Unos días atrás, perdí un celular que había pagado en cuotas por más de un año. Hoy por hoy, perder un celular es quizás algo semejante a perder un dedo por ser casi una extensión de nosotros mismos; lleva una cantidad de información necesaria y personal, y sobre todo, la comunicación que facilita con el mundo exterior. Entre los pensamientos que pasaban por mi mente estaba la preocupación de no poder cubrir el gasto de otro nuevo y agregando algún plan de seguro para evitar este tipo de situación en el futuro. No me preocupaba tanto la pérdida o robo de datos, pues todo era recuperable y protegido por varias contraseñas. En el peor de los casos, el nuevo poseedor de mi aparato simplemente lo borraría y lo vendería. Mientras rondaban por mi cabeza estos escenarios, traté una vez más de llamar a mi número, y contestó un joven hombre guatemalteco que justo pasaba por la entrada de la Iglesia en ese momento. Tenía apenas un mes en este país, y estaba sin trabajo. Había caminado desde Hoboken para devolverme el teléfono después de haber contestado a un familiar mío que marcó mi número y le explicó que yo soy sacerdote de la parroquia de San José. Con una honestidad admirable este señor me dijo: "cruzó por mi cabeza no tomar estas molestias y buscar la manera de vender su teléfono porque necesito el dinero, pero no se puede engañar a Dios incluso si usted nunca lo supiera." Ni siquiera es católico, sino "más o menos" Evangelico. Ante tal muestra de caridad, no hay palabras adecuadas. A éste buen samaritano aplican las palabras de Jesus: *Todo aquel que os dé de beber un vaso de agua por el hecho de que sois de Cristo, os aseguro que no perderá su recompensa (Marcos 9:41)*. Nunca sabemos cuáles son las puertas que la Providencia puede abrir cuando pensamos en el bien de otro y no en nuestro provecho momentáneo por más justificable que sea, y con confianza en ella tomamos una decisión "arriesgada" pero limpia. RECONOCE A DIOS EN TUS MOMENTOS ORDINARIOS

Construyendo Sobre la Piedra Angular

Antes de casarme con mi esposo, asumí que había "casas feas" y "casas bonitas," y eso fue todo. Pero Matt es arquitecto, alguien que lee libros con títulos como "Una Guía de Campo para las Casas Americanas" por diversión y que usa el término arquitectura vernácula como si supiera lo que significa.

A través de él, he llegado a aprender mucho acerca de por qué ciertas estructuras simplemente no tienen un aspecto agradable. Resulta que hay una lógica en la fealdad. Una de las razones principales por las que un edificio o una casa puede parecernos feo a algunos de nosotros es porque ha sufrido una renovación descuidada. Ya sea por pereza o por un esfuerzo por ser rentable, se realizan adiciones que se apartan del estilo arquitectónico de la estructura original. El resultado es descuidado, confuso, feo, a falta de una palabra mejor.

Lo que se agrega más tarde debe parecerse un poco al original. Si deseas apartarte drásticamente del estilo original de un edificio, es mejor construir una estructura separada por completo.

Pienso en este principio cuando considero a Cristo como la "piedra angular." Sabemos que estamos llamados a modelarnos en Cristo, a construir sobre su ejemplo. Pero muy a menudo elegimos elementos de su mensaje e intentamos desarrollarlo con adiciones que no tienen sentido.

Cuando alguien nos mira a nosotros, a nuestras vidas, debería poder decir de quién es el patrón de esa vida. Debemos asemejarnos a la piedra angular, si no lo hacemos, será evidente, indecoroso. No puedes ver a Dios Padre sin abrazar a Dios Hijo. No se puede trazar el futuro de una casa sin pensar en su pasado.

Si Cristo no es nuestra inspiración, será nuestra contradicción.

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
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
