

13 Domingo de Tiempo Ordinario

Cuando se habla de un "milagro," a veces se habla en sentido amplio y piadoso del "milagro de la vida," con ese asombro que siente nuestro espíritu ante algo bello y transcendental que no podemos explicar del todo. En sentido estricto, los milagros son una posibilidad dentro la Providencia de Dios, y se define como *un hecho captable por nuestros sentidos que sobrepasa el orden no ya solo de la naturaleza sensible, sino la creada. El orden de la naturaleza se refiere a todo las leyes de la física, todos los seres vivos o inertes, todo lo que se puede explicar hablando de causas y efectos naturales, y todo lo que podemos percibir con nuestros sentidos (ver, oír, tocar, olear, etc.). Hay también un orden sobre-natural, que como su nombre indica, va mas alla de naturaleza o cualquier poder natural sin destruir o aniquilar ese fundamento natural.* Pero ejemplo, decimos que un gato hace lo que hace por naturaleza. El gato tiene cierta forma de ser y comportarse segun su instinto felino. Un gato es naturalmente curioso. Busca sobrevivir y comer por naturaleza. No necesita alguna ayuda especial para hacer lo que hace de eso modo natural. Pero cuando nosotros lo llevamos a casa y lo vestimos, y conversamos con el como si fuera humano, y le damos de comer una comida exquisita a pesar de que podría haber cazado un ratón, la vida que vive ese gato en nuestra casa es en una vida sobre-natural, porque lo que le ofrecemos va mas alla de lo que el gato necesita para ser un gato de manera natural. Pero por mas que le hablamos y lo vestimos, nunca comprenderá o hablará como un ser humano. Nunca deja de ser lo que es por naturaleza: un gato. Va mas alla de su necesidad natural esa vida sobre-natural que vive un nuestro hogar. Lo mismo sucede por ejemplo con la gracia de Dios, que es algo sobre-natural. Ser hijo de Dios a traves del bautismo, participar in su vida interior como hijos, o hablar de la encarnación de Dios en el vientre de María, y cosas por el estilo, son cosas que va mas allá de cualquier capacidad o necesidad natural humana. Pero de la misma manera en que un gato no deja de ser un gato cuando lo adoptamos como mascota, y tampoco entiende el idioma que hablamos, tampoco la gracia de Dios que nos perdona y nos transforma en hijos de Dios quita nuestra humanidad.

De allí el conocido y importante refrán teológico que dice "la gracia no destruye sino que presupone, sana, eleva y perfecciona la naturaleza." Por ejemplo, un ser humano, a pesar de estar en gracia de Dios, no deja de tener mal-humor o tener necesidades humanas. El sacerdote que es ordenado y no es casado, nunca deja de sentir la atracción o anhelo que siente cualquier hombre por naturaleza, pero un favor o "gracia" especial de Dios lo puede animar y sostener a pesar de cualquier debilidad o lucha interior. En otras palabras, tenemos que recordar que cualquier Sacerdote o Cristiano sigue siendo un ser humano imperfecto y limitado a pesar de la gracia de Dios. La gracia no quita sus idiosincrasias, su carácter particular, sus gustos, sus debilidades particulares, ni tiene que suplir o intervenir en las cosas que piensa o hace según su capacidad humana. Le resulta difícil al ser humano por naturaleza perdonar a sus enemigos, porque requiere la ayuda de la gracia que va mas alla de una ira natural y entendible contra el enemigo.

El ser humano es capaz por su naturaleza inteligente de explicar y inventar muchas cosas, pero solo a Dios le pertenece el acto de crear. Así, el "orden de la creación" se refiere a Dios como La Primera Causa que creó de la nada la existencia de las cosas y las sostiene en existencia. El ser humano en sentido estricto no puede crear nada, sino hacer o inventar. Se habla de "hacer" o "tener" un hijo, no de crear de la nada un bebe ya formado. Tener un hijo presupone la existencia de otros seres y otras condiciones, mientras que Dios inició la existencia de todo lo que hay de la nada. La creación está dentro del poder divino, y por eso la acción creadora de Dios no es un milagro en sentido estricto, como tampoco es la transformación sobrenatural del pan y vino en el cuerpo y sangre de Cristo a pesar de ser un hecho sobre-natural, porque no es captable por nuestros sentidos (no vemos o olemos o oímos la transformación de los elementos o la presencia de Cristo. Se requiere "ojos de Fe.").

Entonces, un milagro en sentido será la resurrección de un muerto, como ocurre en el Evangelio de este domingo, o la bilocación de algun santo, por ser cosas que otros podían ver y oír, donde hay una suspensión de la leyes naturales por una intervención de Dios y por algún propósito o bien según su gloria. Por la misma razón, ningun milagro se hace o se pide con solicitud caprichosa, como los que dicen que crearán en Dios o la Fe si alguien entrara su habitación volando, como si estuvieran en situación de árbitro ante Dios y igual a El, desafiándolo de manera desapasionada y pensando que pueden acercarse a la verdad de las cosas sin respeto o humildad.



13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When we speak of "miracles," we speak in a wide and metaphorical sense of the "miracle of life," or the amazement we feel about beautiful and transcendental that we cannot fully explain. In a strict sense, miracles are a possibility within God's Providence, and are defined as something perceived by our senses that surpasses both the created order and the natural order. The "order of nature" refers to the laws of physics, to all living or inert beings, everything that can be explained by natural cause and effect, and everything that we can perceive with our senses (see, hear, touch, smell, etc.). There is also a super-natural order, and as its name indicates, it goes beyond the natural order without contradicting it or destroying it. We say for example boys will be boys and girls will be girls. We might say that a cat does what it does because it's a cat. A cat has a certain way of life and behaving according to its feline instinct. A cat is naturally curious. A cat survives and hunts by nature. A cat doesn't need any special help or push from us to do what it does naturally. But when we take a cat into our home and dress it up and talk to it as if it were human like us, or feed it with exquisite diet that is not a mouse it could have killed on its own, the life that cat lives in our home is technically speaking a *supernatural life, because what we do for that cat goes beyond what it needs to be a cat by nature.* Yet, no matter how much we talk to a cat and dress it up, it will never understand or speak like a human being does. A cat doesn't stop being what it is by nature. The supernatural life that it lives in our home goes beyond what it naturally needs to be a cat. The same thing happens, for example, with the grace of God in us, which is something supernatural in us. Being a child of God through baptism, participating in the inner life of God, or things like incarnation of God in the womb of Virgin Mary without the intervention of a man, are all things that go beyond any natural human capacity or need. But in the same way that a cat does not stop being a cat when we bring it home, neither does the grace of God which forgives us and transforms us into children of God take away our frail and messy humanity.

Hence the well-known and important theological principle that says "grace does not destroy but presupposes, heals, elevates and perfects nature." A human being, despite being in God's grace, does not stop having mood-swings or human needs. The priest who is ordained and unmarried does not stop feeling the attraction or longing that a man feels by nature, except for a special favor or "grace" from God that helps and sustains him despite any weakness and struggle. In other words, we have to remember that any Priest or Christian for that matter is still an imperfect and limited human being despite the grace of God. Grace does not take away the idiosyncrasies, or the particular character, or tastes, or particular weaknesses, nor does it replace or intervene in the things we can think or do by nature. It might be very difficult for us by nature to love and forgive our enemies. It requires the help of a grace that goes beyond the natural and understandable rage we hold against our enemy.

A human being is capable through natural intelligence of explaining and inventing many things, but only to God belongs the act of creation. The order of creation refers to God as The First Cause that set into being the existence of things from nothing and sustains that existence. A human being in the strict sense cannot create anything as God does, but only fashion or invent. We talk about "making" or "having" a baby, not about creating a baby out of thin air already formed. Having a child presupposes the existence of other beings and prior conditions, whereas God initiated the existence of everything from nothing. Since creation is within divine power, God's "creation" is not a miracle in the strict sense, nor is the supernatural transformation of bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ despite being a supernatural event. That transformation is not accessible to our senses (we do not see or smell or hear the transformation of the elements or the presence of Christ. The "eyes of Faith" are required).

Therefore, a miracle in the sense is the resurrection of the dead, as in this Sunday's Gospel, or the bilocation of a saint, because of a suspension of natural laws that others could see and perceive due to a special intervention of God for a purpose. For that same reason, no miracle is done or asked for on the basis of pure whim or "just cuz," like those who say that they would believe in God or have Faith if they saw someone fly into their room after making a wish, or whatever other random thing they might use to "test" God, as if they were in the position of referee equal to God in a dispassionate way, perhaps thinking that they can approach the question of truth without respect or humility. WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Face-to-Face Confession

Question:

In today's digital world, do we really need to be face-to-face with a priest to confess our sins? Would Facetime or Zoom ever be allowed?

Answer:

The question of whether or not Catholics can celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation virtually (via social media, by phone, or in some other way) is a question that has actually been around for several years. The recent COVID-19 pandemic brought the question back in a new way, especially as many parishes were forced to introduce a sort of "social distanced" confession, with the sacrament being celebrated outdoors.

In reflecting on this question, however, there are a couple points that we want to keep in mind. First, as the Code of Canon Law observes in different places, the faithful have a right to the sacraments of the Church and the Church's ministers have a responsibility to make them accessible. At the same time, however, we always have to be sure that we respect the nature of the sacraments themselves.

Although modern forms of technology and communication can help us in our work of evangelization catechesis, the Pontifical Council for Social Communication has reminded us that, "Virtual reality is no substitute for the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, the sacramental reality of the other sacraments, and shared worship in a flesh and blood human community. There are no sacraments on the internet" (The Church and the Internet, no. 9).

Although our encounters with others on the internet and via social media can be considered "real" in one sense, in the sacraments we encounter Christ in a personal and ecclesial way. It is never just a private experience but is always grounded in the life of the Church and this means that it must truly be personal, including the contact between the confessor and the penitent. While the convenience or ease of online celebrations might be appealing for many reasons, at heart, we always want to keep in mind the fullness of the Church's tradition and the meaning of the sacraments. -©LPI
